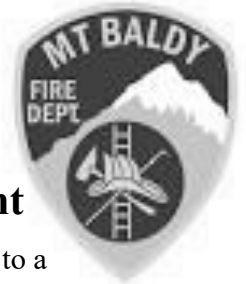

These new units will replace our aging 20-year-old defibrillators and provide our firefighters with improved technology, enhanced reliability, and upgraded features to better serve our community during medical emergencies.

Congratulations to our Firefighters

Congratulations to **Firefighters Reece Cate and Andrew Curran**, who recently earned their **California DMV Firefighter Endorsement**, allowing them to operate our larger fire apparatus weighing more than 26,000 lbs.

Earning this endorsement requires approximately **40 hours of specialized training** followed by a DMV examination. With their certifications, **7 of our 18 volunteer firefighters** are now qualified to drive our largest emergency vehicles.

Qualifications:

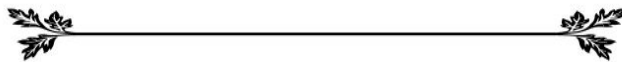
- ♦ QuickBooks and Microsoft Excel proficiency

Why the weather reports and forecasts, for any station on Mt. Baldy, are not the same on Weather Underground and NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration). Data differences compared.

Weather Underground and NOAA forecasts differ because they use different base computer models, rely on different local data sources, and feature varying levels of human manipulation.

Data Source Differences

- **NOAA:** Relies purely on government-operated models (like the American GFS or High-Resolution Rapid Refresh), backed by an expansive network of official radar, weather balloons, and government buoys. Its text forecasts are heavily curated by human meteorologists at local National Weather Service offices.
- **Weather Underground:** Uses a mix of government model data, proprietary algorithms, and an enormous global network of over 250,000 allows WU to provide hyper-local

readings, but personal station equipment can sometimes be less calibrated than government equipment.

Algorithmic Adjustments

- **NOAA:** Focuses on the raw, unadulterated scientific data directly from the models.
- **Weather Underground:** Aggregates and smooths out multiple models using proprietary software, frequently updating to reflect the nearest personal weather stations in your specific zip code.

Because of these distinct methods, one might catch a localized microclimate earlier, while the other might be more accurate at predicting broader regional patterns.

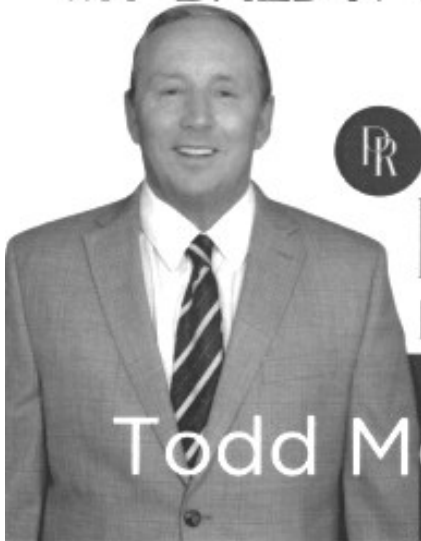

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Town Hall News

This article is a compilation of Town Hall minutes from meetings since the last Baldy Breeze. It focuses on the main points of reports and presentations made by invited guests/visitors, along with Town Hall business that may be of interest to the community. Some reports may be regarding events now concluded.

ZOOM Videoconferencing: Town Hall meets via Zoom on the first Tuesday of every month, at 7:00 pm. Meetings are open to all residents.* The meeting link is posted several days prior on the Baldy Bear Telegraph Google Groups email and the "Mt Baldy Residents" Facebook page. Regular invited guests are from the U.S. Forest Service, SBC & LAC CHP, SBC & LAC Sheriff's Dept., SBC Fire, Mt. Baldy Fire, and representatives for both LAC and SBC supervisors. Their attendance allows residents to ask questions and make comments in real time.

If you wish to have a topic added to the agenda, please contact your Town Hall board representative or you may make the request during a meeting.

The following reports were made by visitors in April 2026 through June 2026.

Kyle Hauducoeur, Battalion Chief (SBC-Fire)

May: Our preparedness continues, improving our communications with our cooperators up there, both the forest and LA County Fire. We are working through mutual communication plans. These things take some time with additional approvals.

We will be scheduling Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) inspections for the lower end of the community, just above San Antonio Heights. You may hear people who associate with your community that we were out there doing a wildland interface inspection. It's a five-question questionnaire for our company officers. We're attempting to expand that program in the coming years to include more communities. What we're doing is targeting the very high fire hazard parcels on the maps, drawn out by the State Fire Marshal's office. That's our intent. It's not a full and complete rollout. We're still trying to feel our way through the process for recording that information and then recalling it at a later date to say in which communities we've been able to do treatment.

And we continue to support those parts of Mt. Baldy that are attempting to harden the construction in their homes and need advice on that, and make them more fire-resistant.

R. Wismer asked: The Homeowners Association is trying to expand its roads in the Village, and needs more information about any permitting needed, because it's a private road. After a conversation* with Richard, the BC advised him to reach out to the Fire Marshall for assistance. [*The entire conversation notes from the Zoom transcript were provided to R. Wismer separately.]

Brendan Hidalgo (LACBOS2/Barger/Assistant Field Deputy)

April: Provided updates regarding ongoing Eaton Fire rebuilding efforts. Reported approximately:

1,025 homes under construction

2,000 permits issued

3,000 rebuild applications submitted

Announced Metro K Line expansion to include a Hollywood Bowl stop. Invited the community to the Annual Tribute to Veterans and Military Families event on May 23 in Arcadia Park

May: First an extended approval of Supervisor Barger's motion on the Eaton Fire Recovery. It directs advocacy for expanded mortgage relief for the survivors. It extends forbearance from 12 to 36 months, and it requests a deadline to January 2029. This reinforces the county's commitment to securing resources to help residents rebuild homes and communities.

LA County Approves \$5M in CalHome Wildfire Recovery Funds: The Board of Supervisors approved accepting nearly \$5 million in state CalHome funds to support homeownership for those impacted by the January 2025 wildfires. Eligible households can receive down-payment assistance of up to \$200,000 or 40% of the home's purchase price. The program expands eligibility to moderate-income families earning up to 150% of the Area M. From what I remember, this, unfortunately, doesn't include those in the Mt. Baldy area.

June: The primary election is taking place today. The centers will be open from 10 am and closing around 8 pm.

Our veterans tribute event a couple weeks ago was an amazing event, with an amazing turnout. Thank you to everyone who attended, and all the veterans that we were able to serve. The LAC BOS will be going on recess at the beginning of July, just for a few weeks, and then will be back after the summer break.

Lee Miller (LACDPW Community Liaison)

April: Proposed flashing warning lights and signage improvements near the lower tunnels. Funding is expected during the next fiscal year after July 2026. Follow-up discussions related to Christmas Eve storm damage and roadway grading concerns. Agreed to address outdated Forest Service closure messaging still appearing on the electronic sign at the bottom of the hill. Mr. Miller also reminded residents to report road, water, or sewer issues through the Public Works 24-hour dispatch line: 1-800-675-4357

May: Last month, a resident requested an update to the message that was on the changeable message board. The message was outdated, so we removed that a couple after that request.

Comment from S. Sulkin, regarding waiting for a response from Mr. Edward Lee, engineer, LACDPW, about what he said at the February Town Hall meeting. Mr. Miller responded that he will follow up with Mr. Lee on that.

June: There was an illegal dumping of tires along Mt. Baldy Rd. that was cleaned up yesterday. If anyone sees any type of illegal dumping, please report it to Public Works by phone or by email address. The email address is dumping@pw.lacounty.gov. The phone number is 888-253-2652.

And in the worst-case scenario, you can email me too, and I'll forward that inquiry to the right people at Public Works.

Questions for Mr. Miller: Resident Tony Witt asked Mr. Miller if there's a plan to resurface Mt. Baldy Rd., in LA County, approx. 5 years from now. Is that the earliest that'll be done, and what we can expect in the meantime. I see a lot of potholes, a lot of cracks. Mr. Miller responded: Let me dig in and see if there is a specific schedule. I don't think there is, but if there is, I would definitely share it at the next meeting.

Graham Hendrickson, Chief (MBFD)

April: A transient was breaking into cars in the Ice House Canyon area. He was seen walking off the mountain and may have been contacted by Deputy Smoot in San Antonio Heights. In addition, a couple hundred feet of copper phone cable was stolen by the rest area/public restroom above the Village, and he believes that a report was made.

Julius McChristian, Captain (SBCSD)

April: Added in response to G. Hendrickson's comment: Confirmed that the transient suspect that was connected to vehicle break-ins near Ice House Canyon had been arrested. And detectives are actively investigating the recent copper wire theft near the rest area/public restroom.

Reported increasing visitor activity with improving weather. Stated that weekend volunteer patrols continue assisting with enforcement.

May: Since our last meeting, our deputies have been dealing with issues with homeless individuals who have been trying to camp near the Mt. Baldy church. We've been swiftly getting those folks to move along, advising them that they can't camp there, and getting them off the mountain as well.

We've had our share of search and rescues on the mountain. Most of those have been hikers, who were able to hike out. We had a couple of search and rescue teams respond to assist those folks off the mountain. We did notice that, since last month, some Mt. Baldy residents also have been assisting some of those hikers. The last thing we want is add to any situation, having the residents go out there and get injured or have to be rescued as well. The only thing we ask is that if you do notice someone who is stuck on the mountain, you can assist the best you can, but if they've already contacted law enforcement, let us go out there and get those folks off the mountain, with our search and rescue teams, for their safety.

June: Things have been pretty good on the mountain for us. We have recently had a few search and rescues. Actually, we just had one, you may have heard the helicopter up there about 30 minutes ago. We did have a couple of injuries last week. We pulled a couple of people off the mountain. But outside of that, it's been good for us on the mountain. We've been having our COPs and our volunteers on the mountain on a regular basis, writing citations for all those who are violating vehicle code sections or double parking their vehicles during the weekends. With the warmer weather, the crowd is getting larger on the mountain right now. (S. Sulkin mentioned that the COP have been all the way back into Barrett Canyon.) We had a meeting this morning to talk about a strategic plan of how we can get our staff up there and be a little more effective for all the residents up on the mountain, and that was a piece of it, kind of doing a little bit more than just citations and being creative as well.

I want to present some statistics, in regard to costs for services that we've handled. I normally do this at the end of the year, but I'll try to do it every 6 months. When we're talking about the Mt. Baldy area in 2025, on Mt. Baldy alone, we had a total of 573 calls. And then the San Antonio Heights area, we had a total of 2,004 calls. Our busy months in the Mt. Baldy area are March and December. Our busy months in the San Antonio Heights area are March and June. There were 2,023 calls in March in San Antonio Heights, and 217 in June.

Between January and the end of May 2026 in the Mt. Baldy area, we had a total of 243 calls. So, we're about on the same rate for calls of service in the area. Of those, the majority were information calls and extra patrols with our deputies going up there. And then in the San Antonio Heights area, between January and May, we had a total of 468 calls.

Mark Tovsen, Officer (LAC-CHP)

April: Reported minimal activity due to staffing commitments for the Baker to Vegas relay event. Encouraged residents to contact CHP with concerns.

Priscilla Bugayong, Community Liaison (SBCBOS2/Armendarez)

April: Announced that she will be leaving the supervisor's office for a new opportunity. Introduced Alondra Cabrera as the incoming field representative. Contact information: Alondra.cabrera@bos.sbcounty.gov

Announced upcoming "Mobile Hours" event at Mt. Baldy Lodge on April 22 from 11:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Juan Galván, Community Resources Officer (CHP-SBC)

April: Reminded attendees that April is Distracted Driving Awareness Month. Announced increased motorcycle safety enforcement activities planned for May. Noted that radar trailers will likely return to the Mt. Baldy area during the summer months.

May: There are a few issues along the 210 corridor, Carnelian and Sapphire, regarding homelessness. I have been out there and sighted a few people and tried to get them to move along. This may indirectly affect the San Antonio Heights or Mt. Baldy areas but, nonetheless, we are out there, citing and trying to get these encampments out of the freeway area. Just be aware, if you do see any encampments in Mt. Baldy or in the San Antonio Heights areas, let law enforcement know, and we'll go about it that way.

May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month. The weather was not cooperating at the beginning of the month, so we'll see if it warms up. If it does, and we start seeing an increase in motorcyclists in the Baldy area, we will have our motor officers out there with proactive enforcement, or at the very least, in patrol a couple days out of the month, just depending on what's going on.

June: We had our motor officers up there during the month of May, which is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month.

Samantha "Sam" Villaneda, District Rep. for Assemblymember John Harabedian (AD41)

May: Sam introduced herself. We have 13 bills in the Assembly right now. These are too many to go over right now, but I can send those over to either Christy or Tracy. Now, I want to mention one bill that we're really excited about. It's, AB1642. It's our testing standards bill. The Assemblymember is very focused on wildfire recovery, wildfire preparedness, and the rebuild. And so, this bill would estab-

lish state standards for when families and individuals are allowed to move back into their homes. Right now, there are no state standards, and so it is up to the families themselves to determine when it is safe or they can pay for their own testing. What we're seeing is that families can't afford to do that as they're trying to rebuild, and this has been a huge hurdle for folks over the last year. So, this bill was passed in the Toxic Materials Committee and the Assembly with bipartisan support, and it is now in Appropriations, which takes place next Thursday. We're very hopeful that it'll pass. If that happens, it'll be sent to the Senate, where we'll have a lot of work to do, but we are very hopeful that it'll get past the finish line. I will be sure to send summaries of the 12 other bills via email. And if there are any questions or any state-related concerns, please feel free to reach out. I'll put my email in the chat.

Sean Brady, Deputy (LACSD)

April: Reported continued parking enforcement activity along Mt. Baldy Rd. and Barrett-Stoddard area. Discussed several recent search and rescue responses. Mentioned department impact related to the recent death of a deputy connected to the Baker to Vegas event.

Alondra Cabrera, Community Liaison (SBCBOS2/Armendarez)

May: We have our Save-the-Date for our district open house coming up on August 20th, from 5 pm to 7:30 pm.

June: Gave a reminder about the supervisor's August Open House.

Deputy Pete Bommarito (LACSD)

June: On the LA County side, we've been trying to get some more parking enforcement up there at the Barrett-Stoddard area. I know that's continually a problem. And coming into the summer, we're going need more; however, we're trying to find the funding to staff that.

Another issue--I've been talking with Supervisor Barger's office. There are individuals in the Cow Canyon Saddle area that have a personal shooting range and, just to let you know, I am personally making contacts, just as I did last year when we had issues with shooting during school hour; but now I heard that there's probably a higher caliber weapon or a large blast coming from that area. So, I'm waiting for callbacks from my contacts there. I'll be taking a trip up there to try and handle that and make sure that everybody's safe and they're compliant to all the laws as well.

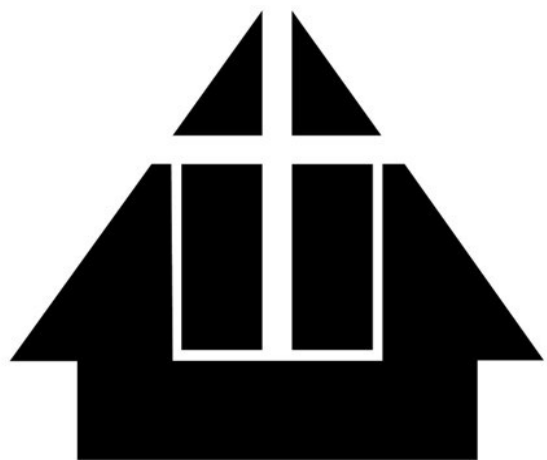
Other than that, our guys are still patrolling up through there. Over the last holiday weekend, we had pretty good turnout on both sides of the mountain that we cover, and really had no major issues. Maybe a few little search and rescues that we had here and there, but nothing major and significant. I'm happy with my team.

And the deputies that are up there patrolling...if there are any questions, please let me know, and we can hopefully solve problems for you guys.

Lieutenant David Milinkevich (CHB-SBC)

June: I'm new to the area as of January. I just wanted to touch base and see if there's anything anybody had for us, and mostly just introduce myself.

We believe in obedience and service produced in us through the work of the Holy Spirit, not as a prerequisite for His grace and membership in the Body of Christ.

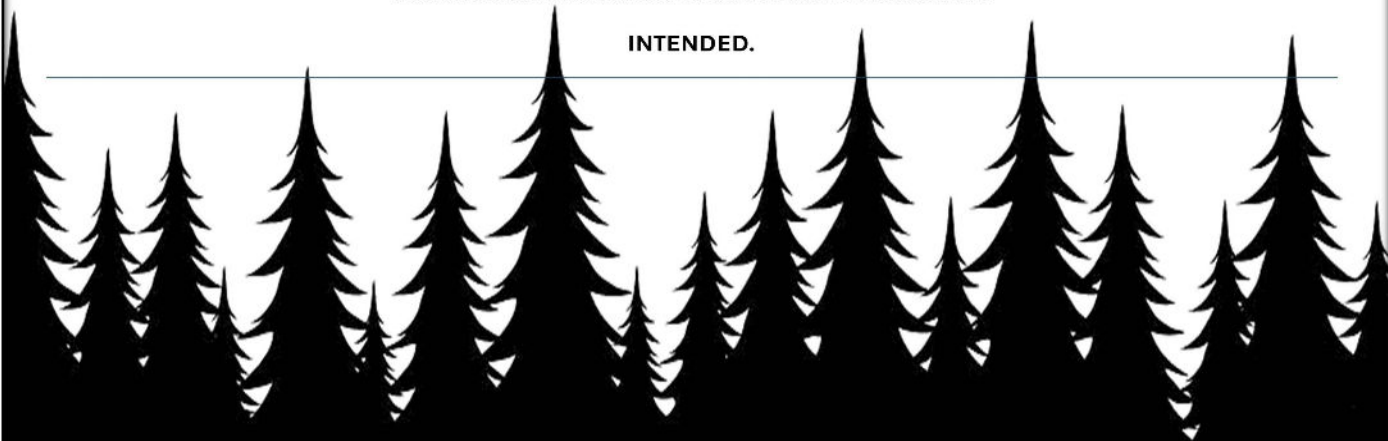
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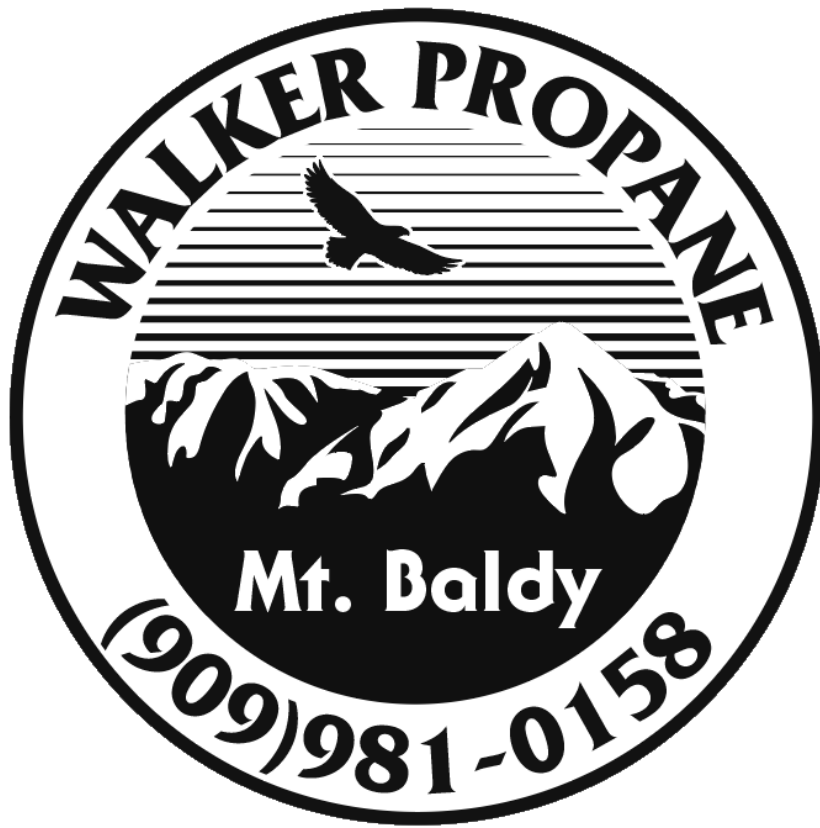
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
